Keeping the Story Alive

Our club is honored to have several members who lived in Liebling and are primary sources to tell us about their Easter celebrations. Here's their story.

In Liebling, Confirmation Day was observed simply during Holy Week with a church service on Green Thursday or Good Friday. Every household served creamed green spinach at the main meal on Green Thursday, and all meals on Good Friday were meatless. In the afternoon of Confirmation Day the Godparents presented their female Godchild with a bolt of fabric for an overskirt or their male Godchild with money. Then the confirmands presented their Godparents with a personal letter of thanks for their years of love, support and generosity.

The Saturday before Easter was a day of preparation and shopping. Easter eggs were hard-boiled with onion skins to give them a reddish-brown color, then they were rubbed with bacon fat for a shiny finish. Soups were made and tortes were baked for the four course Sunday meal. Children made Easter nests from grass and waited for the Easter Bunny to fill them with a single chocolate bunny, candy, and eggs on Easter morning.

Easter began with a church service and continued with the Sunday meal of soup meat, soup, roast with potatoes and vegetables, then tortes and baked goods. In the afternoon, children visited their Godparents to receive a special treat such as Lebzelten or Pflastersteine (gingerbread cupcakes)!

As you prepare and celebrate your Easter this year, consider keeping a Lieblinger tradition or share this story to keep it alive. Frohe Ostern!
