### Keeping the Story Alive

When my mother handed me her white cotton apron this Thanksgiving, I remembered having seen it many times when I was a child. The upper corners were embroidered with two pink and rose-colored flowers tied together with a purple ribbon, and I recognized it immediately. What I did not know was the story behind this family heirloom.

The apron was handmade by my grandmother and bordered with her hand-crocheted trim. Its lower half was constructed from three panels crocheted together in an open weave pattern. Sewn into each panel were three tiny rows of darts and the overall effect was a stunning work of art.

I was at first confused that so much of my grandmother's work had gone into an apron which was not a royal blue satin apron worn at Kirchweih. "When did you wear this apron?", I asked, and the answer surprised me.

Bridesmaid attendants wore such a white cotton apron over a red cashmere skirt on Krenzel Abend, the evening before the wedding. On this night the groomsmen and bridesmaids prepared for the wedding by collecting dinnerware in large baskets and carried the baskets to the hall for the wedding dinner.

White aprons were also worn by a select group of girls at Kirchweih. On Kirchweih, girls wore their finest Tracht to the afternoon dance and later returned home to change into their evening Tracht. Occasionally a group of boys hired the band to play at one of their homes between the afternoon and evening dance, and their girls would join them later at the boy's home. Only then did these girls wear their white aprons over white cashmere skirts for the evening dance, while all the other girls wore their blue satin aprons.

Christkind also wore a white apron when she came to Liebling's homes on Christmas Eve. My mother wore her white apron when she appeared as Christkind, and at this year's Christmas program, Christkind will wear it again.
